
Response and Safety Considerations for F-35 Aircraft Incidents

- Background: Modern aircraft, including the F-35, utilize composite materials that can release potentially harmful substances during a fire. This guidance provides essential information for all personnel responding to an F-35 aircraft mishap.
- This <u>DOCUMENT</u> has been prepared by the United States Air Force as an aid, should any emergency services organizations respond to an incident involving a F-35 fighter jet.

Electric Vehicles Fire INCIDENT August 16, 2025, at 1735 hours: Tractor trailer traveling on 5 freeway in the Sylmar community of Los Angeles experienced mechanical issues related to brakes on the tractor. After pulling to the side of the freeway the brake failure caused a fire in the tractor that extended to several electric vehicles. Eight vehicles on the trailer experienced various levels Photo Credit: Daily News Proper use of PPE always. of damage. Fire spread to first Tesla located above fifth **Photo Credit: LFD** wheel. Six Tesla vehicles ignited and went into thermal runaway. Last 2 Teslas at rear of carrier (top & bottom) sustained front-end thermal damage but did not transition into thermal runaway. 5 freeway closed for several hours. Isolated location required the use of water tenders for supply. Fire resources supported the recovery phase of the incident with a private towing company. Incident was safely mitigated by recognizing the potential risks, allowing the vehicles most threatened to LFD offered incident support in the recovery consume themselves, and protecting the surrounding phase. environment.

Personnel were kept safe with proper distancing

and the proper use of PPE.

INCIDENT

- September 17, 2025. Modular Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) fire.
- Initial involved unit experienced an over pressurization or deflagration event.
- Neighboring unit became involved. 2 units affected by fire and a total of 5 units impacted by the incident.
- Non-intervention tactics applied. Fire watch established. No injuries reported.

Preposition

Cal OES Fire & Rescue Preposition Statistics: *As of 9/10/25*

Fiscal Year 2025/26:

- There have been 34 preposition events approved: 31 for critical fire weather, 1 for Civil Unrest, and 2 for Tsunami.
- 1 Extreme, 13 Severe, 17 Moderate, 3
 Potential Threat to Lives & Improved
 Property.
- The most requested preposition resource and most frequent user: Region III has been approved for 15 prepositions. LG Engines have been approved 129 times.

Incident Reporting Transition NFIRS to NERIS

This November begins the transition from the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) to the National Emergency Response Information System (NERIS).

IMPORTANT DATES

- November 2024 California depts begin transition into
- December 31, 2025 NFIRS will officially retire.
- January 15, 2026 Last day to report 2025 NFIRS data.
- January 31, 2026 Last day to modify or edit 2025 NFIRS data. NFIRS SHUTS OFF AFTER THIS DATE.

IROC / IQS Integration

- IROC Data rules state that IROC cannot be used as a personnel qualification system
- Qualifications need to be maintained into IQS system for Local Government and linked thru IRWIN server to IROC
- We currently have 396 departments and 8698 personnel records that need to be moved to IQS
- The deadline is January 1, 2026. Cal OES is working with IROC administration on a reasonable timeframe
- Cal OES will be communicating a conversion plan to the California fire service within the next few weeks
- We have a good track record and success with IQS, with over 17,000 personnel qualifications already in IQS from California, so this conversion will finish up the transition



Fire Asset Status Tracker (FAST)



FAST was developed and will be implemented as a modern, mobile application to optimize the California Fire Service and Rescue Emergency Mutual Aid System resource order filling and mobilization processes. The application will allow local fire agencies to provide real-time resource status updates while streamlining communication, improving coordination, and easing decision-making across the fire service to expedite all-hazard resources assignments and minimize losses to life and property.
